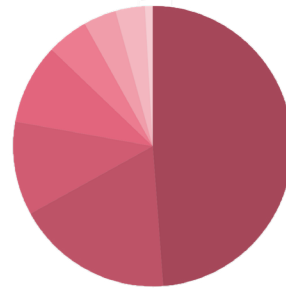

Nutrition Services

10,503 lunches served per day

- » 6.2% served to students eligible for reduced price
- » 18.5% served to students eligible for free meals

1,361 breakfasts served per day

- » 12% served to students eligible for reduced price
- » 42% served to students eligible for free meals

Meal Costs:

- » Breakfast: \$1.20 elementary, \$1.60 secondary, and \$0 for free/reduced
- » Lunch: \$2.60 elementary, \$2.90 middle school, \$2.95 high school, \$0.40 for reduced price, \$0 for free
- » *State of Minnesota pays the \$0.40 reduced price*

World's Best Workforce Goals:

Achievement Gaps: Narrow the achievement gap by 50% by 2017.

Kindergarten Readiness: Increase the percentage of students meeting district fall cut scores for both Letter Sounds Fluency (10) and Letter Naming Fluency (13) from 52.9% in the Fall of 2013 to 66.9% in the Fall of 2017, a total increase of 14% and an annual increase of 3.5%.

Third Grade Literacy: Increase the percentage of students of meeting spring state proficiency targets in third grade from 65.0% in the Spring of 2013 to 75.5% in the Spring of 2017, a total increase of 10.5% and an annual increase of 2.6%.

College and Career Readiness: Increase the percentage of students of meeting fall PLAN college and career readiness benchmarks in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science.

Graduation Rates: Increase the percentage of students graduating from high school within four years of starting from 89.6% in 2013 to 92.7% in 2017, a total increase of 3.1% and an annual increase of 0.8%.
