A. PURPOSE OF REPORT

- a. March 18-19, 2022 Park, East Ridge & Woodbury High Schools Jazz Bands 90 students and 12 adult supervisors will travel to Duluth, MN. to participate in a Jazz Festival. They will travel via motor coach busses and will be staying at the Country Inn West in Duluth. (Tark Katzenmeyer & Tom Storm)
- b. March 31 April 3, 2022 East Ridge High School Girls Golf Team 13 students and 3 adult supervisors will travel to Kansas City, MO. for a golf tournament. They will travel via school vans and will stay at a VRBO. (Kathy Madden)
- c. July 14-23, 2022 East Ridge High School Spanish Program 13 students and 2 adult supervisors will travel to Costa Rica. Hosted by Educational Tour Company. Air travel and hotels to be announced. (Michele Salinas)

1. What group is taking this trip?

ERHS, PHS, WHS Jazz Bands, 90 students, 4 directors, 8 chaperones

2. Destination, Date/Time of Departure, Date/Time of Return

Destination: Duluth, MN

3. State purpose and educational value of trip.

Purpose

The Jazz Band plan to visit the campus of UMD, a realistic post-secondary option for many of our students. They will participate in a clinic with music professors from UMD, listen to and interact with students from other local high school jazz bands. In addition, we attend a concert given by a professional jazz quarter.

Performance Tour Goals

- Demonstrate and appreciate musicianship at the highest level through performance in jazz music.
- · Represent our school, district, community in performance.
- · Recognize the importance of working together to achieve goals and to problem solve.
- · Reflect on experiences and the impact they had on their own knowledge and appreciation of music.
- · Understand the significance of music in the development of culture.
- · Enrich relationships with other students across the district.

4. Name the manner of travel and the carrier.

We plan to travel via 2 Motorcoaches operated by Jefferson Lines.

5. State proposed housing arrangements.

We plan to stay at the Comfort Inn West in Duluth. A handful of other hotels were reviewed; however, the Comfort Inn was the most economical and centrally located for our performances and activities.

6. Describe parental involvement in planning – including who, what where, when and how.

Each Band Boosters were involved in the planning process and are supportive in raising funds to reduce costs of the trip. Progress and updates in the process of planning the trip were discussed at monthly meetings open to all band members and families.

7. List Participants.

A final roster will be available when all students have registered and completed Type II Field Trip Forms.

8. Describe the manner of selecting participants.

All jazz band members are eligible for the trip, however not required to participate in the trip to be in the bands. Students are given various opportunities to fundraise a portion of the cost of this trip.

9. Indicate who will be in charge of the supervision the trip.

Each Band Director (Brent Comeau, ERHS / Tark Katzenmeyer, WHS / Tom Storm, PHS) will be in charge of selecting chaperones and direct supervision of the trip.

10. State the safety precautions and procedures for emergencies while on the trip.

Parent chaperones will be chosen based on experience supervising student groups, as well as medical doctor or EMT experience. In addition to parent chaperones; the each band director and assistant jazz band director will be responsible to supervise the band members for the duration of the trip.

District 833 and UMD COVID Protocols will be followed. We will bring all hospital information on the tour to help facilitate getting medical attention to any student or chaperone who is in need. All chaperones will carry mobile phones and have the director's phone numbers. Chaperones will be briefed before the tour regarding policies, procedures, and steps to take in emergency situations.

Procedures for Student Illness or Medical Emergency:

- · Student's parents will be called and consulted about treatment procedure or acceptable medications.
- · If a student is not able to participate in the day's activities, a chaperone will stay with the student at the hotel.

• In case of severe medical emergency, students will be taken to the nearest hospital immediately. The information on their health form will be used until their parent or guardian will be consulted.

Procedures for Student Separation from Group:

- · Chaperone will attempt to contact student via cell phone.
- · Chaperones will retrace the steps of that student. Director will contact student & parents.
- · A picture of the student or students will be provided (via infinite campus) as a reference for chaperones and other venue officials who may aide in locating the student(s).
- · A chaperone will always wait at the assigned meeting or pick up point in case the student returns to that spot while others are searching.

11. Give budget costs, how the trip will be funded and estimated cost per student.

Per Student Cost: \$150

Each Band Booster Organization is committed to organizing group fundraisers to cover the additional group travel costs.

12. State evaluation procedures.

Each student and chaperone will be given an evaluation form by the director. Comments made by these participants will be taken into account when planning future educational performance tours. Each student and chaperone will also be asked to evaluate Gateway Music Festivals and Tours by the director.

13. List any proposed precautions, special needs, special concerns, student concerts, - if applicable.

Precautions - Logistics

The logistics for a performance-based tour are thoroughly planned for the duration of the trip. Thousands of dollars in instruments and uniforms must be carefully packed and transported via coach buses, used in performance and returned home to each school in good condition. Timing on the day of our performances of arrivals and departures must be timed accurately with transport, setup, warmup, performance, tear down, etc. to be successful. For these reasons we spend lots of time and great care in planning a safe and rewarding performance/travel experience for our band members.







Day 1: Fly to Costa Rica

- Meet your Tour Director at the airport.

Day 2: San José | Tortuguero

- Travel to Braulio Carrillo National Park.
- Travel by boat to Tortuguero.
- Free time in Tortuguero Village.

Day 3: Tortuguero

- Enjoy a boat tour through the Tortuguero canals.
- Visit Tortuguero National Park-the most important Caribbean breeding ground for the green sea turtles, who have lived here for more than 100 million years. Begin your visit in Tortuguero Village, gateway to the Tortuguero National Park. Founded in the 1930s by Colombians exporting sea turtles and coconuts, Tortuguero Village today is accessible only by boat and home to just 700 residents. Next, explore the twists and turns of the Tortuguero Canals on a boat excursion. High rainfall and convergence of freshwater and the Caribbean sea make the beaches, canals, lagoons, and wetlands of Tortuguero areas of exceptional biodiversity. See if you can spot a howler monkey, a toucan, or maybe even a caiman.

Day 4: Sarapiquí

- Travel to the Sarapiquí region.
- Time to see Sarapiquí or
- enjoy a canopy tour.

Day 5: Arenal region

- Time to see more of Sarapiquí or o enjoy whitewater rafting.
- Travel to the Arenal region and get ready for an adventure to remember. Behold the perfect conical shape that emerges from the green hills of Alajuela: this is the fascinating Arenal Volcano. Overlooking the San Carlos plain and the Pacific lowlands, this mile-high volcano has been active for the past 7,000 years. You'll see the volcano from a different angle on your kayaking excursion. Not only does the volcano serve as a watershed for the lake, but it also provides thermal energy for the nearby hot springs.

Day 6: Arenal region

- Take a kayaking trip along Lake Arenal.
- Hike to La Fortuna Waterfall.
- Enjoy the hot springs.

Day 7: Guanacaste

- Continue on to Guanacaste, where you'll feel the sand between your toes as you become immersed in this natural wonderland.
